

2. Gospel text: John 8:1-11

At dawn he appeared again in the temple courts where all the people gathered around him, and he sat down to teach them. The teachers of the law and the Pharisees brought in a woman caught in adultery. They made her stand before the group and said to Jesus: “Teacher, this woman was caught in the act of adultery. In the Law Moses commanded us to stone such women. Now what do you say?” They were using the question as a trap, in order to have a basis for accusing him.

But Jesus bent down and started to write on the ground with his finger. When they kept on questioning him he straightened up and said to them, “Let any one of you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her.” Again he stooped down and wrote on the ground.

At this, those who heard began to go away one at a time, the older ones first, until only Jesus

was left, with the woman still standing there. Jesus straightened up and asked her: “Woman, where are they?” Has no one condemned you?”

“No one, sir,” she said.

“Then neither do I condemn you.” Jesus declared, “Go now and leave your life of sin.”

6. Background Notes for John 8:1-11

The Pharisees and teachers of the law circle her, in the Temple. Very sure of themselves – they have the whole weight of the Law of Moses behind them. Mob justice will quickly be done. The woman is shamed, terrified, a few minutes from death.

Jesus does not stand up to meet them. He chooses not to be engaged on their terms but remains stooped, scribbling on the ground. (Scholars disagree about the significance of what he is doing). As they persist with their questioning he stands up to turn the tables on them. As they slink away the men have judged themselves. He engages the woman in judging the situation and assessing the outcome. She is free to go. But she doesn’t run. She stays and Jesus talks to her in full public view, eye to eye, heart to heart. He sees deeper into the life-giving truth within her. There is no judgement, only belief in her ability to turn things around and love more responsibly.
